GOVERNOR

Governor Proclaims April Sexual Assault Awareness & Prevention Month

On April 1st, Governor Greg Abbott issued a proclamation recognizing April 2025 as Sexual Assault Awareness and Prevention Month in Texas. This month is a time for

Texans to come together to raise awareness around the issue of sexual assault and to recognize the courage of survivors across Texas and throughout the nation.

Governor Abbott Said, "Every person is worthy of respect and protection, especially from acts of sexual violence. The State of Texas works tirelessly to defend Texans from these cruel offenses, making sure that each perpetrator is prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law. Each April, we acknowledge the strength and courage of each survivor and recognize their resiliency and hope. As we work together to prevent sexual assault in our state, may we honor each survivor, raise awareness, and build a future where each Texan can live in safety."

Texas Association Against Sexual Assault CEO Rose Luna added, "We commend the State of Texas for prioritizing efforts to assist sexual assault survivors and for its commitment to funding and supporting rape crisis centers. Their impactful work provides critical resources and advocacy for survivors across the state."

Governor Abbott Participates on Texas Law Federalist Society Event

On April 3rd, Governor Greg Abbott participated in a fireside chat with the Texas Law Federalist Society where he touted the state's exceptional policies that have led to a booming economy, a world-class business climate, and a safer Texas at The University of Texas (UT) at Austin.

Governor Abbott said, "We must use the law as both a sword and shield. There is a need for speed to have policies enacted. That led to the creation of a new court of appeals that has expert judges swiftly deciding on matters that ensure government operates effectively, efficiently, and as swiftly as possible in business matters. These new business courts are now a magnet for business enterprises coming to Texas. Today's lawyers have a role to play that's more important than ever before. By getting involved, the next generation of lawyers will restore law and order in Texas and across the nation."

Moderated by UT Austin interim President Jim Davis and Texas Law Federalist Society President Jordan Lamb, Governor Abbott drew attention to Texas' Fifteenth Court of Appeals which provides swift resolutions for complex commercial disputes in Texas. The Governor also mentioned the success of Texas' border security mission, Operation Lone Star. The Governor noted that Texas deployed thousands of Texas National Guard soldiers, installed buoys and miles of razor wire, and built our own border wall decreasing illegal crossings into the state by 85 percent.

SENATE

The Senate was in session Monday through Thursday this week.

On Monday, the Senate passed 13 bills including:

SB 379 by Mayes Middleton (R-Wallisville) would prohibit **supplemental nutrition assistance program benefits** from being used to purchase an energy drink; a sweetened beverage; a carbonated beverage; candy; potato or corn chips; or cookies.

SB 965 by Tan Parker (R-Flower Mound) would codify the **right** of a **school district** or charter employee to engage in **religious speech or prayer** while on duty may not be infringed on by the district or charter unless the infringement is necessary to further a compelling state interest and narrowly tailored using the least restrictive means to achieve that compelling state interest.

SB 686 by Angela Paxton (R-McKinney) would **allow students to transfer** from one school district to another district (not just adjoining districts) that offers the appropriate grade level and has capacity.

SB 924 by Kelly Hancock (R-North Richland Hills) would exempt **streaming content** from the definition of "cable service;" and would add streaming content to the definition of "video service."

SB 961 by Lois Kolkhorst (R-Brenham) would make it unlawful for a person to file a claim under a **state health program** without indicating the type of licensed held by the **health care provider** that provided the service.

SB 988 by Paul Bettencourt (R-Houston) would increase the penalty for the offense of criminal mischief involving impairment or **disruption to a retail motor fuel pump**.

SB 1024 by Paul Bettencourt (R-Houston) would prohibit a local entity from authorizing **anticipation notes** to pay for a project **if the voters have rejected** a bond proposition to fund the **same project** within the past five years.

SB 1038 by Kevin Sparks (R-Midland) would update statutes related to **Medicaid** fraud.

SB 1202 by Phil King (R-Weatherford) would allow a person authorized to review a development document required by a regulatory authority to install a **home backup power installation** without having to submit the document to the authority for review.

SB 1252 by Charles Schwertner (R-Georgetown) would prohibit a municipality from adopting or enforcing an amendment to the National Electrical Code that would regulate the installation or inspection of a **residential energy backup system**.

SB 1697 by Judith Zaffirini (D-Laredo) would require the Public Utility Commission to develop a guide to provide consumers with basic information and

guidelines to consider when determining whether to install a **solar energy device** at their residence.

SJR 57 by Joan Huffman (R-Houston) would propose a constitutional amendment prohibiting the use of state funds to pay for the debts or other obligations of a **local public retirement system**.

They also passed three bills to Third Reading:

SB 318 by Brandon Creighton (R-Conroe) would establish the **Election Integrity Division** in the Office of the Attorney General to investigate reports of election fraud or that a person has committed an election offense.

SB 707 by Phil King (R-Weatherford) would authorize the **legislature** to determine that a **federal law**, rule, or other directive is **unconstitutional** and to prohibit a state or local government or employee from enforcing it.

SB 875 by Brian Birdwell (R-Granbury) would make it a Class A misdemeanor for a **school superintendent** to use state or local funds including use of the district's e-mail, telephone, mailing list or meeting to **electioneer** for or against any candidate, measure, or political party.

On Tuesday, the Senate passed the three Third Reading bills and 23 additional bills including:

SB 8 by Joan Huffman (R-Houston) would require the sheriff in counties with a population of 100,000 or more to enter into a written agreement with the U. S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement to authorize officers and employees of the **sheriff's department to enforce federal immigration law**.

SB 16 by Bryan Hughes (R-Mineola) would require a person to submit **proof of citizenship** to **register to vote**.

SB 108 by Bob Hall (R-Edgewood) would allow **alternate presiding election judges** to freely observe the area in which voters are being accepted for voting and to appoint election clerks to assist them.

SB 207 by Angela Paxton (R-McKinney) would allow an **excused absence** for students to attend a **mental health appointment**. *It passed by a vote of 31-0*.

SB 371 by Donna Campbell (R-New Braunfels) would require written parental consent for a student to participate in **human sexuality instruction**.

SB 396 by Lois Kolkhorst (R-Brenham) would require voter registrars to deliver a voter a written confirmation notice requesting **confirmation of the voter's current address** if the voter's residence address is a commercial post office box or similar location that does not correspond to a residence.

SB 472 by Kevin Sparks (R-Midland) would allow the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board to bring a **counterclaim in an appeal**.

SB 533 by Kevin Sparks (R-Midland) would require an **election** for the **authorization** of the issuance **of bonds or a tax increase** to be held on the November uniform election date.

SB 599 by Royce West (D-Dallas) would prohibit political subdivisions from adopting an ordinance requiring a **licensed child care home** or **registered family home** to comply with health and safety standards exceeding those adopted by the Texas Health & Human Services Commission.

SB 621 by Kevin Sparks (R-Midland) would prohibit a political subdivision from establishing, operating, or owning an organization or entity that is organized for the purpose of **engaging in banking**.

SB 856 by Pete Flores (R-Pleasanton) would authorize **Skills Development Fund** money to be awarded to projects that partner with Texas A&M Engineering Experiment Station.

SB 965 by Tan Parker (R-Flower Mound) would codify the **right** of a **school district** or charter employee to engage in **religious speech or prayer** while on duty may not be infringed on by the district or charter unless the infringement is necessary to further a compelling state interest and narrowly tailored using the least restrictive means to achieve that compelling state interest.

SB 1207 by Phil King (R-Weatherford) would require the **parenting awareness program** of a school district to include information related to adoption.

SB 1330 by Kelly Hancock (R-North Richland Hills) would prohibit a nonparticipating supplier from charging an enrollee more than 115 percent of the **Medicare**-approved amount for **durable medical equipment**.

SB 1497 by Robert Nichols (R-Jacksonville) would **exempt skimmers** from the definition of **wireless communications device** for purposes of the prohibition on peace officers search a person's wireless communication device without a warrant.

SB 1498 by Robert Nichols (R-Jacksonville) would add **digital currency** to **asset forfeiture** statutes.

SB 1535 by Judith Zaffirini (D-Laredo) would establish an **Advanced Nuclear Energy Workforce Commission** to address the workforce needs of the advanced nuclear energy industry.

SB 1619 by Judith Zaffirini (D-Laredo) would authorize the use of **epinephrine delivery devices** in schools.

SJR 37 by Brian Birdwell (R-Granbury) would propose a constitutional amendment clarifying that a **voter must be a U.S. citizen**.

On Wednesday, the Senate passed 20 bills including:

SB 7 by Charles Perry would establish the **Texas Water Fund Advisory Committee** to oversee the Water Fund structure and would increase responsibilities of the Texas Water Development Board over financing and reporting of water projects.

SB 125 by Bob Hall (R-Edgewood) would require a hospital to allow an individual on whom a medical procedure is to be performed to provide a **direct blood donation** for the procedure.

SB 578 by Royce West (D-Dallas) would require a housing development that receives an allocation of low-income housing tax credits to install operable exterior **surveillance cameras**.

SB 617 by Charles Schwertner (R-Georgetown) would require municipalities to hold a public hearing before converting a property under the municipality's control to **housing for homeless individuals**.

SB 763 by Carol Alvarado (D-Houston) would require Texas Commission on Environmental Quality to conduct a protectiveness review of permits to operate **concrete batch plant** at least every six years.

SB 878 by Brian Birdwell (R-Granbury) would prohibit **municipalities** from entering a **Chapter 380 agreement** that provides an **ad valorem tax exemption**; but grants or loans would be allowed.

SB 906 by César Blanco (D-El Paso) would authorize the **Ysleta del Sur Pueblo** to commission peace officers.

SB 920 by Kevin Sparks (R-Midland) would make open-enrollment charter and private school employees immune from liability for damages or injuries resulting from the **administration of medication** to a student if the school has received a written request to administer the medication.

SB 985 by Paul Bettencourt (R-Houston) would allow the commissioners court of a county to **combine election precincts** if a redistricting plan results in a precinct with fewer than 500 registered voters.

SB 1084 by Donna Campbell (R-New Braunfels) would require information on a patient's breast density to be included in **mammography reports** provided to the patient.

SB 1366 by Robert Nichols (R-Jacksonville) would require information about construction or maintenance work zones to be added to the curriculum for **driver education and driving safety courses**.

SB 1816 by Kelly Hancock (R-North Richland Hills) would institute regulation and registration of **miniature vehicles**.

They passed 2 bills to Third Reading:

SB 406 by Mayes Middleton (R-Wallisville) would require **birth certificates** to include a space for recording the **biological sex** at birth of the person as either male or female; and would prohibit a state or local registrar from changing the sex on a birth certificate.

SB 689 by Bryan Hughes (R-Mineola) would require governmental entities to ensure that each unit of the entity does not maintain a **diversity**, **equity**, **and inclusion** office or have an employee to perform duties of a diversity, equity and inclusion office.

On Thursday, the Senate passed the two Third Reading bills and 11 other bills including:

SB 27 by Brandon Creighton (R-Conroe) is the Teacher Bill of Rights bill.

SB 29 by Bryan Hughes (R-Mineola) would allow the governing documents of a **domestic entity** to require that any **internal entity claims** shall be brought only in a **court in this state** and that one or more courts in this state having jurisdiction shall serve as the exclusive forum and venue for any internal entity claim.

SB 875 by Brian Birdwell (R-Granbury) would make it a Class A misdemeanor for a **school superintendent** to use state or local funds including use of the district's e-mail, telephone, mailing list or meeting to **electioneer** for or against any candidate, measure, or political party.

SB 879 by Brian Birdwell (R-Granbury) would exempt drillers or operators of **closed-loop geothermal injection wells** from permitting requirements.

SB 922 by Kelly Hancock (R-North Richland Hills) would prohibit **sensitive test results** from being disclosed to a patient by electronic means.

SB 1098 by César Blanco (D-El Paso) would require a **pharmacist** to disclose to a customer the **lowest cash price** at that pharmacy for the drug or biological product prescribed to the consumer.

SB 1453 by Paul Bettencourt (R-Houston) would require recalculation of the **voter-approved tax rate** based on the debt rate of the taxing unit.

SB 1536 by Judith Zaffirini (D-Laredo) would require persons appointed a **guardian** to complete three hours of **training on dementia** and Alzheimer's disease annually.

SB 1741 by Tan Parker (R-Flower Mound) would require institutions of higher education to annually report to the coordinating board on **funding received** by the institution from a **foreign entity** during the preceding year; would prohibit a gift, grant, or donation from the government of China or a company or entity directly or indirectly controlled by the government of China; and would require researchers at institutions of higher education to complete training on the prevention of **espionage and intellectual property theft**.

SB 2188 by Adam Hinojosa (R-Corpus Christi) would allow the City of Brownsville to restrict beach access on weekdays for **spaceflight activities**.

SB 2230 by Adam Hinojosa (R-Corpus Christi) would mandate evacuations when deemed necessary by the Federal Aviation Administration at the time of a **spaceflight launch**.

They also passed one bill to Third Reading:

SJR 12 by Angela Paxton (R-McKinney) would propose a constitutional amendment establishing a **parent's right to direct a child's education** including choosing al alternative to public education.

Total number of bills passed by the Senate this session: 189

HOUSE

The House was in session Monday through Thursday this week.

On Monday, the House conducted routine business.

On Tuesday, the House passed its first bill of the session:

HJR 4 by Morgan Meyer (R-Dallas) would propose a constitutional amendment prohibiting the enactment of a law imposing an occupation tax on **entities involved in securities transactions**.

They also gave preliminary approval to four bills:

HB 13 by Ken King (R-Canadian) would establish the **Texas Interoperability Council** to develop and implement a statewide strategic plan for governing the interoperability of emergency communication equipment and infrastructure.

HB 135 by Angie Chen Button (R-Garland) would exempt **game and exotic animals** from the **sales tax**.

HB 143 by Ken King (R-Canadian) would require the Railroad Commission to notify the Public Utility Commission and other utilities if during an **inspection of a well site** or surface facility, it discovers a condition involving an **electric power line** that does not meet National Electrical Code standards; and would require the utility to investigate the site.

HB 195 by Mihaela Plesa (D-Dallas) would require property tax information for school districts subject to recapture to be added to the appraisal district database including information on the **percentage of taxes subject to recapture**.

On Wednesday, the House passed the Third Reading bills and one constitutional amendment:

HJR 1 by Morgan Meyer (R-Dallas) would propose a constitutional amendment increasing the **personal property tax exemption** for businesses from the current \$2,500 to \$250,000. (the enabling bill is HB 9)

They gave preliminary approval to:

HB 9 by Morgan Meyer (R-Dallas) would increase the **personal property tax exemption** for businesses from the current \$2,500 to \$250,000. (this is the enabling bill for HJR 1)

HB 22 by Candy Noble (R-Lucas) would exempt **intangible personal property** from ad valorem taxes.

HB 908 by David Spiller (R-Jacksboro) would require law enforcement agencies to **report missing children** to the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children.

HB 1392 by John Bucy (D-Austin) would postpone the **delinquency date** for **payment of ad valorem taxes** if the office of the tax collector is closed on the delinquency date.

On Thursday, the House passed its Third Reading bills.
